President's Message ~ Dave Becker

In my experience, I've found that most people have had someone in their past who stimulated their interest in gardening. My inspiration came from my grandparents, Fred and Edith Rohm.

My family, as I suspect many of yours, lived through the Great Depression, and therefore they were very frugal. The vegetable garden was a key element in their way of life. Fred Rohm was a physically strong gentleman and, until the age of 70, he hand-cultivated his 40' X 60' vegetable garden and assisted my grandmother with her 8' X 50' flower garden.

I admired and loved my grandparents and did everything I could to gain their approval. When I visited them, I would follow my grandfather around like a puppy, obeying his every gardening instruction to the best of my small frame's ability. My grandfather had one firm rule: At the end of the day, before dinner, all the tools had to be cleaned, sharpened and oiled. His motto was, "If you

take care of your tools, your tools will take care of you."

My grandmother not only managed her flower garden, but the canning, storing and freezing of the vegetable harvest as well. Her garden consisted mainly of a massive planting of tulips, hyacinths, daffodils and iris in the spring; roses (her passion) and seeded annuals in the summer; followed by a fall display of chrysanthemums.

Her green thumb is inspiring, and she never paid full price for a plant or a bulb. Most of the plants, other than the roses, came from other gardeners. To this day, most of the plants I buy are on sale or are from another gardener. And at the end of the workday, all my garden tools are cleaned, sharpened and oiled. Because if I take care of my tools, they will take care of me.

Editor's note: Neither the beautifully cared-for tools on the right, nor the humble subjects of American Gothic with their clean and shiny pitchfork (far right) are related to Fred & Edith Rohm. Nevertheless, the images remind us how diligently our forebears worked to take care of their land and tools, and to nurture their families.

It's time to locate, clean and sharpen your gardening tools in advance of our April 3, 9:30 am "opening day" at the Troy Historic Village (THV) gardens. Don't forget to stretch a bit to limber up muscles and joints.

A limited number of THV-owned gardening tools are stored in a shed near the Caswell House. Thus, it is best to bring your own. The TGC will provide yard waste bags. When the bags are full, deposit them by the dumpster in the parking lot. Because school groups will visit the THV during gardening hours, please be sure to place tools where they don't present tripping hazards.

We have been asked to park in the smaller parking lot east of the main building **OR** on Lange Street - the first east-west street north of Wattles and the THV property. The back gates will be open. Co-chair Ken Heck will provide a sign-in sheet near the gazebo. If you have a favorite garden bed, mark the box and head there. If you have no preference, we will direct you to a garden. Gardening at the THV is a weather-dependent event. If it is raining or very cold or snowing, we will not garden.

Though you may consider yourself a novice, please come. You could fill and dispose of yard waste bags, sweep the sidewalk areas, or pick up some gardening tips while working with other members. Remember the saying "Measure twice; cut once"? Verify assignments with your garden captain before you start pruning or pulling. When you've completed your work at one garden, you're encouraged to visit another to offer your help. That is one way to get to know other members.

Please take time to read the page 7 article (especially #1, *Check-in Process*) from Barbara Hubbard, the THV volunteer coordinator. If you plan to garden during a time other than our club's usual first-Wednesday-of-the-month session, please sign in at the main building when you arrive.



HERB STUDY GROUP REPORT -submitted by Kay Betke

Because April 17, 2024, is Daffodil Day – and once again it falls on our third-Wednesday-of-the-month Herb Study meeting day – I'd like to tell you about daffodils, a wonderful flower, instead of about herbs. Following are some interesting facts I learned from *Birds and Blooms*.

Daffodils are divided into 13 different groups including large cupped, small cupped, double, jonquilla and trumpet. There is no difference between a narcissus and a daffodil. Narcissus is the botanical name, while daffodil is the more common name.

Egyptian Pharoah Ramses II was buried with a daffodil bulb on each eye. Because of a chemical compound, daffodils can kill roses if they are put together in a vase. (*Squirrels don't like them either*.) Soak daffodils alone for one hour and don't recut the stems before placing them with roses.

A garden of daffodils can continue to bloom for up to 50 years!

The Troy Historic Village has recently developed a SET OF GUIDELINES for "all volunteers at the Village to follow in order to make sure that everything is safe and fun." The Troy Garden Club has been asked to publish the guidelines in our newsletter. Because the document is long, the following is a summary of the guidelines to facilitate their understanding & usage by TGC members.

The document begins as follows: "Thank you so much for the Troy Garden Club's many years of labor and love spent in the gardens at the Troy Historic Village (THV). Every single year we get SO many compliments on the gardens, and we agree – we think they're phenomenal! In hopes of making our partnership even stronger, we want to go over a few guidelines that all volunteers at the Village follow in order to make sure that everything is safe and fun."

The document's following six points maintain their headings below, but the information is somewhat condensed & summarized:

1. Check-in Process:

Always notify the Troy Historic Village (THV) of your arrival & presence.

On an official Work Day, check in with the Troy Garden Club (TGC) organizer.

On any other day or time, sign our volunteer whiteboard in the kitchen.

Upon leaving, stop in the building to notify us of your departure, or call the Village at 248-524-3570 & request the removal of your name from the whiteboard.

- 2. **If you have concerns/questions** with how things are managed or operated at the Village, *in a non-emergency situation*, please speak with the TGC site leaders, who then will talk directly with the THV Volunteer Coordinator or the THV Director.
- 3. **In an emergency** (anything more than a band aid), notify any THV staff member in person or by calling the building at 248-524-3570. The THV staff will take over from there. Other emergencies (severe weather, fires, active shooter, etc.): THV staff will notify site leader by phone or in person & give further instruction. The TGC site leader will notify all other TGC members on site about the instructions. In general: the main building (large red brick building facing Wattles) will always have at least one THV staff member inside and will likely be your primary safety location.
- 4. **Gate Policy:** All guests visiting the Village must check in at the main desk inside the main building. While working in the gardens, you may need to bring things inside or take them outside through the main gate. **It is very important for the gate to close each time.** Visitors may notice you walking in and out. If they follow you, please direct them to the main building to check in. Also, please help each other and us by making sure the gate stays closed. A gate left wide open is a safety concern.
- 5. **Interaction with Visitors:** Please remember that your interaction with visitors reflects on the Troy Historic Village. When interacting with guests, they cannot tell the difference between a TGC member and a THV staff member. When in doubt, kindly send guests to the main building where a THV staff member will be happy to greet them.
- 6. **Drugs / Alcohol / Smoking / Firearms:** The Troy Historic Village has a zero-tolerance policy for drugs, alcohol, smoking and firearms. If a volunteer is found with the above items, a Troy Historical Society staff member will ask the offender to leave immediately. A formal meeting with the Troy Garden Club and the Troy Historical Society leadership will follow.

- (2) Send information no earlier than the 13th of the month & no later than the 23rd of the month. **NOTE:** The TGC president may delay sending the president's message until the day after the TGC board meeting (usually held on the 4th Wednesday of the month).

(3) SUBJECT LINE OF YOUR EMAIL:

Example: For May TGC Newsletter

- (4) If possible, please send your information in the Times New Roman font.
- (5) Please attach ONLY information for the NEXT newsletter.
- **(6)** If circumstances will prevent you from following the schedule above, please contact the editor ASAP so we both know **what** you will send and **when**.
- (7) VERY IMPORTANT: Send ONLY relatively hi-res photos. *MINIMUM* SIZE OF 900 KB PER PHOTO.
- **(8)** Identify ALL photo subjects, L R. Identify & give credit to ALL photographers.
- **(9)** Please verify members' names AND the *spelling* of members' names before submitting newsletter information.
- (10) When writing narratives, divide information into paragraphs.


