I have also purchased various items at huge discounts at local nurseries and shops: an 18" x 16" pot at 70% off, a new pruner, and potting mix at 25% off. Finally, early in February, I had an altercation with a sidewalk. The sidewalk came out victorious. I think my pride was more bruised than my body.



Or if you prefer, just come to the THV, and our garden captains will help you find a garden area that needs your help. In Memory of TGC Member Kathleen Williams Martin

The following information was obtained from the website of Lynch & Sons Funeral Directors, Clawson.

Born in Salem, Massachusetts, Kathy, her parents & younger brother moved to Michigan in the mid-1950s. She graduated from Lamphere High School and then from Western Michigan University (B.A., followed by an M.A. in special education). After working in the field of education for her entire career, she retired from the Lamphere School District as director of special education.

Kathy and Tim married in 1988. They met at an auto dealership in metro Detroit where Tim sold her a car. They were married for 33 years until Tim's passing in 2021. They, along with their Scottie dogs, were enthusiastic boaters, and they captained both a speedboat and a cabin cruiser.



Kathy was devoted to the promotion of social justice and to those with special needs who required attention and support. She loved working with the disabled. After retiring, she volunteered for the Friendship Club at the Troy Community Center. She also delivered meals for the Meals on Wheels program. A lifelong animal lover, she was a docent at the Detroit Zoo for many years and had a special interest in polar bears. Kathy was also very interested in politics and she actively supported candidates whose interests aligned with hers.

Gardening was another special interest. Her home garden in Troy was beautiful, and it included a pond and waterfall. Her eventual membership in the Troy Garden Club began after her participation in the organization's garden walk. The appropriate Michigan Division contact person will then be notified that the TGC is willing to participate.

The **Daffodils4Detroit** committee invites all MI DIV branches and members who attend Daffodil Day to **LEND** flower centerpieces – 5 per branch – for use at the event. The variety of centerpieces adds to the elegance of the day! **REMEMBER:** Following the event, **the centerpieces will be taken home by those who brought them.** Please do not remove centerpieces until the meeting has concluded.

CENTERPIECE SPECIFICATIONS:

- ➤ 45 centerpieces will be needed.
- Centerpieces do not have to match.
- Use clear glass vases of any shape.
- Place an ID label on the underside of the vase.
- > Centerpieces should not exceed 14" in height and 12" in width.
- ➤ At least 50% of floral materials should be daffodils. Feel free to be creative with the remaining 50%.

- 1. Take them to the Detroit Yacht Club during open hours on Tuesday, April 16.
- 2. OR Deliver them to the DYC no later than 10:30 am on April 17.


(3) SUBJECT LINE OF YOUR EMAIL:
